

The Proclamation of Christmas - Stephen Bulla's arrangement of 5 well known Christmas Carols, is an excellent opening for Weston Silver Band's celebration of the festive season. The Christmas season coincides with the midwinter solstice and the return of the light, literally and figuratively with the birth of Christ.

Blending Druidic tradition and Christianity we have Doug Court's arrangement of **The Holly and the lvy**. The lyrics date to the 1700's, and describe the ancient custom of singing contests pitting male and female, resolved under the mistletoe!

When Jesuit missionaries arrived in the New World, they translated the story of their religion into the framework of the aboriginal peoples. **Jesus Ahatonhia** - the Huron Carol - was written by Jean de Brébeuf, and we present it in this splendid arrangement by former WSB bandmaster Morley Calvert.

Playing bass trombone on this recording, Phil Rayment is an accomplished musician and conductor who wrote **Winter Snow**, this excellent arrangement of the tune *See Amid the Winter's Snow*.

In the old Ukrainian calendar, the New Year occurred in April. **Carol of the Bells** by Leontovych describes a spring swallow flying into the house to proclaim a bountiful New Year. Even though they adopted the Julian calendar so that the New Year is now in the winter, they kept the good music. Brad Harrison provided this arrangement for brass band.

Written for Christmas Eve 1818 by Francis Xaver Gruber with words by Father Joseph Mohr, Philip Wilby has arranged **Silent Night** as a cornet solo beautifully presented by our soloist Brad Norton.

Troika, or the Midnight Sleighride, is taken from Sergei Prokofiev's *Lieutenant Kijé Suite*, a story based upon a linguistic misunderstanding which leads to creation of a fictitious but very adventurous soldier. This jazzy up tempo arrangement comes from Ray Farr.

The Gospel according to Matthew refers to the Massacre of the Innocents, when Herod hears the news of the birth of Christ and orders the death of every male child under the age of two.

The Coventry Carol is taken from a 16th century play called 'The Pageant of the Shearmen and Tailors' and relates the lament of a

mother for her doomed child. Possibly one of the most mournful of Christmas carols, this beautiful melody is arranged by Robert Collinson.

From the pen of Peter Graham, **The Shining Star** is a Christmas march which incorporates several carols including *O Come All Ye Faithful* and *God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen*.

The Christmas Song, written by Mel Tormé/Robert Wells, was first recorded by Nat King Cole in 1946 although the 'definitive' full string orchestra recording didn't appear until 1961. This version is arranged for brass band by Philip Sparke.

In 1857 James Pierpoint wrote **Jingle Bells** as a Thanksgiving celebration for his Boston Sunday School. Derek Ashmore contributes this arrangement in its more familiar Christmas iteration.

A Christmas standard, Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus* is given a splendidly novel arrangement by Harold Burgmayer - **A Soulful Hallelujah**. And while tradition has it that we stand when the selection begins, we think you will not only stand but begin to dance in celebration.

The origin of the words is unknown, and there are two distinct tunes associated with **Away in a Manger**. J. Scott Irvine, tuba player with the True North Brass, has contributed this unique arrangement which he describes as a 'very rough draft', although we know better.

Euphonium soloist Robert Miller brings us the beautiful melody **O Holy Night**. The words were written in 1847 by the mayor of Roquemaure, France who then asked his friend Adolphe Adam, composer of the opera Giselle, to write the music.

The poem written by Cecil France's Humphrey Alexander was put to music by Henry Gauntlet. In a haunting descant it opens the King's College Cambridge Christmas Eve festival of lessons and carols. Philip Sparke created this stirring arrangement of **Once in Royal David's City** which brings our Christmas festival nearly to its end.
